Daycare Centers

Centers that are licensed by the state which provide child care in small groups with well-trained employees.

Home Care

Family Care Providers: care for children in the home of the care provider. This is like a day care environment in a private home.

In-Home Care Providers: take care of children in the client's home. (nanny)

Other Parents: Find other parents to help take care of your children

Babysitters: short term childcare if you are going out for a brief period of time.

- **Charge hourly fees and are hired on a need-to-use basis:** always ask for references when you hire a babysitter, and it is normal to interview babysitter first.

Child Education

Pennsylvania law requires children to attend school from age 8 to 17, with some limited exceptions. Most children go to school from age 5 (kindergarten) to age 18 (end of high school). *Public school* has free tuition and transportation, and enrollment is assigned based on geographic location of the students' residence. *Public Magnet Schools*, on the other hand, have special educational focus on specific areas – special needs, international studies, arts, sciences, etc. – and have various enrollment requirements depending on the school. When enrolling your child in school you must provide:

- proof of your identity & current visa status of you and your child, i.e. passport (of child's as well), immigration documents, and child's birth certificate
- child's immunization records

- US Social Security Number of at least one parent
- Proof of residence in the City of Pittsburgh
 - Provide two documents that show current Pittsburgh address (i.e. driver's license, utility bill, tax statement, copy of a lease)
